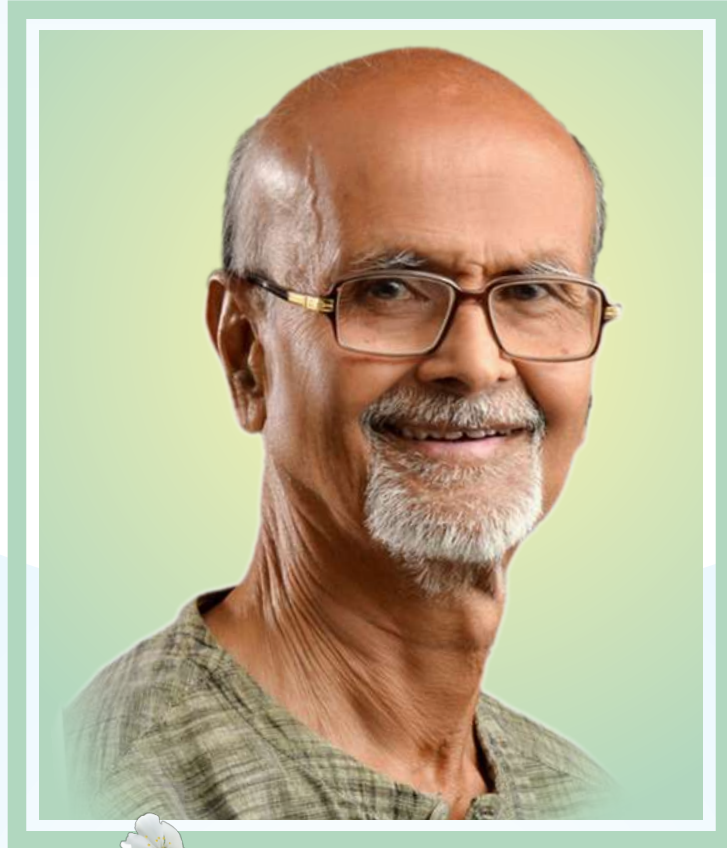

The world was ravaged by the Corona outbreak, and it took more than two years to recover. During the Covid pandemic, Manavlok assisted underprivileged patients by establishing Covid facilities at 16 locations around the Beed region. In addition, many destitute families were given ration packs. Several such activities offered emotional assistance throughout the Covid period. During the difficult times, many contributors assisted Covid 19, and activists also worked hard and implemented numerous initiatives, demonstrating that mankind can confront such crises in the future.

On top of the Corona crisis, Beed district witnessed catastrophic floodings in September 2021. The Manjra, Holna, and Van rivers were inundated, affecting several settlements as well as farmland. Several farmers' animals and crops were washed away as a result of this, and flood water penetrated the community, inflicting damage to buildings and household supplies. Manavlok promptly examined the flood-affected region and distributed drinking water and food. Once the flood situation had been stabilised, Manavlok scanned the flood-affected area and gave financial help to over 200 flood-affected farmer households.

Floods struck Mahad-Chiplun regions of Konkan as well. Thousands of farmers had their crops destroyed. At this time, a team of 20 Manavlok personnel rushed to the flood-affected area to give aid and psychological support.

For all these reasons, Manavlok has stepped up to investigate the impact on agriculture and devise solutions, as well as to motivate and teach people in order to boost people's engagement in the village development process. In recent years, we have also taken on the job of supporting farmers in Marathwada during the drought.

All of this led to a strong understanding that droughts, floods, and infectious disease epidemics are more likely to reoccur. On the one hand, the implications of climate change are growing more concerning, while global customers are increasing their desire for sustainable/organic farming goods. As a result, sustainable/climate resilient farming is becoming increasingly important. As a result, Manavlok's Organic Farming Program is being implemented this year in order to build climate-complementary sustainable agriculture.

Dr. Dwarkadas Lohia (Babuji), the founder of Manavlok, was a major specialist on agricultural and rural development in Marathwada. Via Krishak Panchayat, work on a variety of topics, including fertiliser and agricultural technology, has begun. But, after Babuji, we are all pushing the chariot of Jagannath of Manavlok ahead, and for this, Manavlok is creating a constructive team that believes in working together more.

Would not the effort done beyond the Marathwada region in recent years to enhance the experiments of rural rebuilding of people throughout Maharashtra be a homage to Babuji? We have Marathwada Maharashtra in our hearts when undertaking this effort, but our work should be a continuous homeland, mankind, it is our true sentiment.

In order to achieve to equality, from collective and creative work, in the life of women, landless laborers and marginal farmers. "Marathwada Navnirman Lokayat" "Manavlok" was established in 1982. Ambajogai Taluka in Beed district, similar to other talukas in Marathwada, is drought-prone. The work initially started with ten villages, has now reached farmers from 133 villages of Ambajogai, Kaij, Majalgaon, Parli and Dharur taluka. All the villages are making efforts to achieve 'Gram Swaraj' as envisioned by Mahatma Gandhi. Across the region, economy is directly depended on agriculture. Due to lack of industrialization, other avenues have not opened up. Thus, the region is totally dependent on rainfall and farmers have no other option but to wait for monsoon. The marginal and landless, which are the most likely to be affected, migrate to sugarcane fields. The number from Beed district itself is a staggering 3.5 lakhs people every year, with at times 90% of the village migrating.

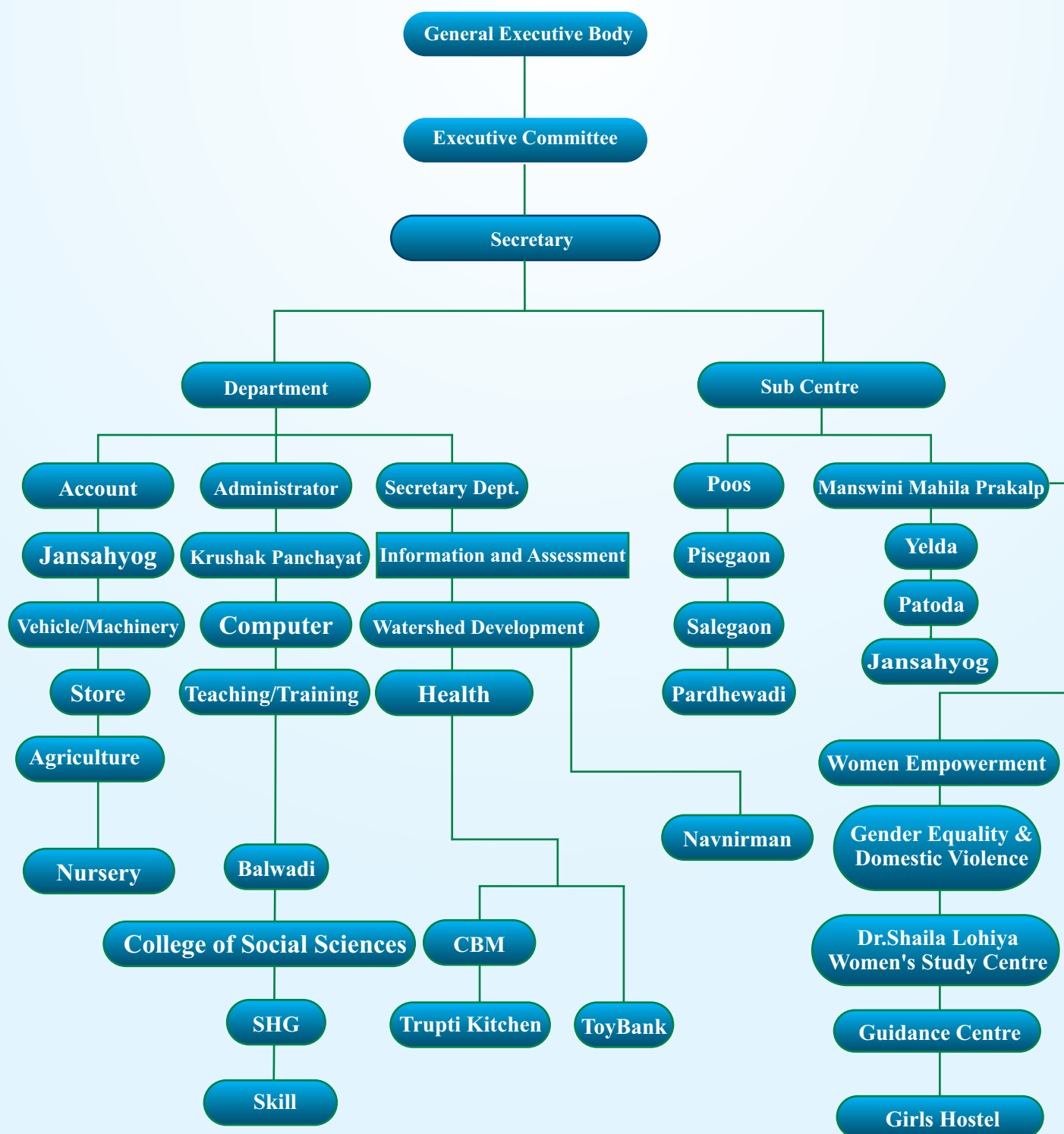

01 Minutes of the Annual General Body meeting 2021

The Institute held its 39th Annual General Meeting on July 24, 2021. The event was presided over by the Institute's Chairperson, Shri. Ashokaravji Deshmukh.

The Executive read out the report from 1 April 2020 to 31 March 2021, and it was unanimously agreed by all present.

The Water Resources Department of the Government of Maharashtra gave Hon. Mr. Aniket Lohiya the second Jalbhushan Award 2020 on the occasion of the centennial birth anniversary of former Chief Minister Late Shankarraoji Chavan. Chief Minister Uddhav Thackeray presented the award. Everyone congratulated him.

Mr. Lalasaheb Agle read out the previous meeting's minutes before the meeting, which were unanimously accepted. Shri. Annasaheb Roham submitted the prior accrued costs to the meeting, which was unanimously agreed. Shri Amit Randad, Chartered Accountant, delivered the Manavlok Sanstha's Audited Report for the fiscal year 2020-21. It was passed unanimously.

In 1996-97, the Manavlok Sanstha Constitution was modified. To make it easier for the organisation to implement the programme in accordance with the new government rules announced from time to time, as discussed in the executive trustees meeting, it was discussed in the annual general meeting and a special meeting should be called, and a three-member committee was formed to amend the constitution. Mr. Prakash Paranjape, Member Hon. Mr. Bajrangdasji Lohiya and lawyer Hon. Adv. Mr. Satish Kalam and as assistant Mr. Ramdas Kale Assistant Librarian Manavlok Social Work College will look after the work. It was discussed in the House and unanimously approved.

Manavlok Sanstha provided basic amenities to 16 Covid care centres during the second wave of Covid-19, resulting in the creation of 945 beds and the treatment of 2537 patients. In addition, 29 oxygen concentrator units were made accessible to patients at a reasonable cost with an assurance of return.

Manavlok gave 11500 ration packs to those in need. Swami Ramanand Tirtha Medical College and Hospital's ventilator equipment were restored, benefiting patients throughout the Covid era.

It has been announced that a water literacy course would be developed and delivered by Manavlok Samajkarya College. This course is being produced under the guidance of Hon Mr. Sumant Pandey, Yashda Pune. Notwithstanding the fact that the aforementioned resolutions have been enacted, it is requested that these minutes should be authorised.



02 Manavlok General Administration



On April 1, 2021, Manavlok celebrated its 39th anniversary. Shri. Baburao Maroti Mane inaugurated the replica of Baliraja on this day, in the presence of Manavlok President Shri. Ashokrao Deshmukh. On this day, all of the workers were present. A blood donation camp was later arranged, and 19 participants donated blood. In addition, Manavlok Exec. Shri. Aniket Lohiya delivered the year's full layout on the theme of "Lekha Jokha Manavlokcha" live on Facebook. In response to the second wave of Covid-19, the Manavlok Sansthan resolved to open a 100-bed Covid care facility for patients after a meeting with activists and college employees. At Manavlok Headquarters, a Covid Care Center with 80 beds and full amenities was established. In addition, because to the increased number of Corona patients as a result of the second wave, Covid care centres were established in 16 locations, offering basic amenities on behalf of Manavlok.

Hon. Supriyatai Sule MP and Hon. Mr. Dhananjay Munde MLA Guardian Minister and Social Justice Minister of Maharashtra State performed the online inauguration of Covid Care Centers in Manavlok, Bansarola, and Ghatnandur on April 26, 2021. Manavlok offered tea, breakfast, decoction, lunch, at 4 o'clock evening meal at the Covid Care Center at the Manavlok Headquarters from 31/05/2021 to 09/06/2021. After the number of corona patients reduced, the Covid centres in Loldgaon, Ashti, Ghatnandur, Kumbephal, Neknur, Kuslamb, Gevrai, and Majalgaon were closed, and the supplies distributed there were returned. Manavlok General Body Member Shri. Swaroop Singh Chavan passed away on April 21, 2021, and Manavlok founder member Shri. Jagannath Jogi passed away on September 24, 2021, following which activists paid respect to them. Mr. Anandrao (Bapu) Chavan, Res. Hatola, too passed away, and all the activists attended his wake.



On December 7, 2021, Manavlok Karykrata Mr. Ravi Khatavkar's mother and Mr. Abhijit Kapse's brother in-law died, and karykarte attended his burial. On the 7th of September 2021, the birthday of Dr. Dwarkadas Lohiya (Babuji), 28 recipients whose householder perished in the second wave of Corona were granted Rs. 30,000. (Thirty Thousand Rupees). 65 farmers who grew Custard Apple received financial help. 5 Manavlok Samajkarya College students who finished first, second, and third in the university were also honoured. In addition, four girls who lost their fathers during Corona received cell phones.

From September 7, 2021 to November 23, 2021, various programs were conducted online via Facebook Live on different topics. On November 23, the inauguration of the conference room set up at the headquarters took place, which was attended by all past and present karyakarta.

To prevent a shortage of ventilators during the second wave of COVID-19, Swami Ramanand Teerth Medical College and Hospital in Ambajogai, along with Swastik Mediservices in Thane, invited two engineers, Mr. Anand Kolhatkar and Mr. Vinay Mahamuni, to repair ventilators.

Workers who were preparing kits of essential items were paid Rs. 3500 for their labor. Mr. Aniket Lohiya and his team went to Chipalun to help those affected by the floods. They visited the villages affected by the flooding in the Ambajogai area, surveyed the area, and provided aid to the people there as per their needs.

Mr. Aniket Lohiya was awarded various prizes for his work during the flood. The workers and the people in the village congratulated him for his efforts.

A total of 115 letters were received in response to the appeal, and 711 letters were sent to various offices. Currently, the organization has 171 workers working in various departments.

There were 8 monthly, 3 quarterly, and 37 weekly meetings held at the headquarters. The fourth annual general meeting of the trustees and the 39th annual general meeting of the people were held.

118 workers received health insurance, and 56 workers received accident insurance. Diwali sweets were distributed between November 2 and 7, 2021.

03 Water and Soil conservation programmes

3.1 Mitigating Drought through Sustainable Water Recharge Projects:

Between 2017 and 2022, a new construction project was launched in 20 villages in the Ambajogai and Parali talukas. The project included activities such as watershed management, fruit tree plantation, irrigation and farming systems, capacity-building workshops, and successful implementation. The measures undertaken as part of this project aimed at sustainable and long-lasting conservation efforts for the benefit of farmers and agricultural consumers.

As a follow-up to this project, "Drought Proofing through Sustainable Replenishment Project" was launched in the villages in 2022. As part of this project, capacity-building workshops were conducted for 85 farmer consumer groups who were previously involved in the project. An estimate of the damages incurred due to the various activities undertaken, such as river rejuvenation, desilting, check dams, soil bunds, cement bunds, composite gabion, etc. was prepared by reviewing the work undertaken under the project. The severity of the damages was assessed in the estimate, and the stakeholders will work together to implement corrective measures in the upcoming phase.

The total number of villages covered under the project is 22, and 85 farmer consumer groups participated. A total of 418 farmers participated in the project.

3.2 Drought Prevention Project

Under this project, the Maharoogi Seva Samiti of Varora, Chandrapur district, in cooperation with the sub-center Salegaon in the Osmanabad district, has completed the work of digging 27 wells in the villages of Kaddora and Vhantala, which had been facing a water scarcity problem. The completion of the work was verified through a paper audit.

Under the Tharmax project, awareness campaigns on weather-resistant farming and the subject of the creation of Shivansh Khats in the villages of Wangi, Mohitevadi, Darphal Gawadi were carried out. Capacity-building training was also provided to workers in all three villages.

Through the construction and renovation work carried out in Ranmasale village, the water of the river has increased, and a program of Jalpujan was organized to celebrate this achievement. At this time, Mr. Aniket Lohiya, as well as Mrs. Sujata Deshpande, Mrs. Sukhda Gayakwad, Mr. Kiran Bhise, and local farmers were present.

Through the joint efforts of the Human World and the Maharashtra State Police Housing and Welfare Board, the repairs of Pazar Talav and Sandhwa Talav were carried out, as well as the construction of the Kandi Ghat. As a result of this work, the water that was created is now under the control of the village's Sarpanch.

4.Agriculture / Agriculture Support – 4.1.Dense plantation project



Human settlements and the joint efforts of Human world and LTF have led to planting of more and more trees in the suburbs of Bhavthana, Pisegaon, and Salegaon using the Miyawaki method, which ensures planting of as many trees as possible in the least possible space. The trees compete with each other, forming natural bonds of friendship, and encourage each other's growth. The method involves selecting fallow land and extracting good soil and mixing it with manure and rice husk and digging trenches to plant the saplings. The soil from the trenches nourishes the trees, and the rice husk used as mulch retains water and helps the growth of useful microorganisms and humus. The Miyawaki method recommends planting 50 to 100 types of indigenous trees in the least possible space.

Forestation should not be for timber production, but rather to promote biodiversity, to exploit the medicinal properties of plants for human welfare, and to increase green areas in the least possible space, which can be achieved through this method. The Miyawaki forestation is an excellent option to address climate change, and it has been successful in Japan through various experiments. Using this technique, 68,444 trees have been planted in the suburbs. Additionally, the process involves community involvement, and the locals also feel a sense of ownership towards the plantation, leading to its better maintenance.

There are a total of 11 machines available with the organization. The report was sent to the Jamkhed Development Foundation for work. Later, due to COVID, the work was stopped and they were called back. With the help of the 52,120 running meters of the Gal Poelen canal in Asthi taluka, the machines were used to fill the fields of 33 farmers. Various organizations, colleges, and schools were given machines in their appropriate form for various works.

In the report, during the cleanliness campaign of the Canal Department with the possession of the Vasmat Canal under the cleanliness campaign, a total of 7 machines worked for 3,009 hours. Under this campaign, 315 km of the canal was cleaned. The total cost of all these works came to Rs. 22,00,000/- and was debited to the public account.

4.3. Rope Nursery

The importance of tree plantation is well known. Especially during the monsoon season, many people plant trees, but during the last two years, due to the Corona crisis, not many people have shown interest in this. The Eco Battalion Army unit in Aurangabad has provided special assistance in this regard to the human population. The Awege Management Services, a Delhi-based company, is helping the human population in preparing at least 15,000 ropes annually. The human population has provided machines to the army center for 750 hours of use. Mr. Aniket Lohiya, the director of operations, and Mr. Annasahab Roham, the treasurer, visited this nursery. Due to this nursery, tree planting is growing in the hilly areas. Therefore, they have a desire to develop this nursery further with the help of human assistance.





5. Department of Agriculture Technology



MANAVLOK'S Organic Agricultural Program:

There is a significant demand for agricultural products from rural areas to cities and towns. However, farmers often lack assurance in meeting these demands. To address this, the Department of Agriculture Technology has initiated a Human-centered Agricultural Program to promote precision farming among rural farmers through chemical farming techniques. This program aims to provide high-yield crops such as soybean, cotton, and pigeon pea during the kharif season and wheat, barley, sunflower, mustard, corn, and sorghum during the rabi season. The program is currently being implemented in 42 villages in Ambajogai, Kej, Dharur, and Parli talukas of Beed district. On May 25, 2021, Mr. Aniket Lohiya, through Facebook Live, invited farmers to participate in this program. Within a short period of time, with the help of the local community, 236 farmers out of 450 acres have started implementing the program. The Sahyadri Balaghat Farming Producer Company Limited, Hassanabad, which operates under the guidance of local farmers, has been providing farmers with agricultural inputs at a rate lower than the market price. Their efforts are aimed at establishing a system that provides farmers with a better return on investment than traditional methods.

The minimum basic price or direct market price at the time of purchase of sensory products will be given as the price, which will be higher. If the market price is lower than the expected value, then the minimum basic price will be the purchase price. Premium/bonus will be given to sensory products that complete the outcome. In the first year of sensory agriculture, a 5% bonus will be given on purchase rates. In the second year, a 10% bonus will be given on purchase rates, and from the year of sensory certification onwards, a 20% bonus will be given on purchase rates.

With the help of Sahyadri Farms, Nashik, the National Sensory Agriculture Production Program is being implemented, as well as providing agricultural practitioners with scientific and pure sensory production technology to comply with international standards. In this program, a team of human resources visits the direct peak areas, organizes agricultural schools, and arranges meetings with experts. Trusted guarantees for sensory agriculture are provided by the loyal sensory commitment of the human world in the cooperative customer warehouses.

In this program, participating farmers have purchased 124 tons of central sensory soybeans from the Sahyadri Balaghat Farmer Producer Company Ltd., Hasanabad, under the guidance of human beings, during the Kharif 2021 and Rabi 2021-22 seasons, earning an additional profit of Rs. 10,00,000/- as a premium. Under the proposed program, it has been decided to make it possible to cultivate more than 1000 acres of crops in the Kharif 2022-23 season.

Facilitation Center Farmers Producer Companies:

Under this program, farmers in the working area are encouraged to register with the Farmers Producer Company, obtain all necessary permits for the company, plan the business for the companies, and guide them in keeping their accounts through the facilitation center. The facilitation center has also provided guidance and assistance to register 5 new farmers producer companies for various businesses in a timely manner.

5.1. Sitaphal Plantation Program:

Despite the global lockdown due to COVID-19, farmers continue to take care of themselves and others, following rules and regulations on the farm. This is because they cannot afford to let their crops go to waste. Human efforts towards agricultural development and increasing productivity of farmers are constantly being supported by various new initiatives. Through these initiatives, farmers are provided with assistance in crop selection, planning, weather, markets, and more. One such initiative is the "Kordevahu Fruit Garden Plantation Program", which is being implemented in collaboration with various organizations including Fanakai Foundation, Mumbai, Young Volunteers Organization, Give India, and the Manek Charitable Trust. This program has been launched in Palsakheda, Dhavadi, Saygav, Radi, Bodhegav, and Kavalewadi villages, covering 109 acres of land for the "Sitaphal" (custard apple) plantation project. The farmers involved in this project have been guided on the plantation techniques. Modern techniques such as drip irrigation and providing the custard apple plants with ropes have been provided to the selected beneficiaries of this program.

5.2. Sustainable Mango Farming Program:

Due to the natural cycle of winds and storms, there has been a significant loss of mango crops in the mango orchards of the farmers in Kokan, which has led to the introduction of the Sustainable Mango Farming Program with the help of ADM Cares, for the benefit of human beings and food and insect life in Kokan. The program aims to provide guidance and hands-on training to small-scale mango farmers who have suffered losses due to the damage to their mango orchards. The program is scheduled for November 17th and 18th, 2021, and will involve discussions with farmers in Panchanadi and Bagmandale to guide them on how to rejuvenate their damaged mango orchards and bring them back to life. To support sustainable mango production, literature will be provided, along with 55 beds of cow manure for mango cultivation, 400 farmers will receive 2500 crates to transport mangoes, and carts will be provided for mango harvesting.

Department of Health



"**Community Action for Health (UAK)**" is a process in which people have worked with people for public health rights. Under this project, meetings were held with workers in Ambajogai and Bid talukas every month to review the progress of the work and plan for the future. Representatives of the people and senior officials interacted with the doctors, employees, and people in the 39 various health centers in Ambajogai and Bid talukas to understand their problems, questions and difficulties and made efforts to solve them. A total of 13 meetings of the Primary Health Center Supervision and Planning Committee were held. The taluka supervision and planning committee meeting was held on August 10, 2021, at the Dhonor rural hospital, in the presence of the president of the Panchayat Samiti. A total of 17 members were present at the meeting, including 6 sarpanchs from different villages. Discussions were held on health services during this meeting. To increase accountability and responsibility in public health services, health gram sabhas were organized in 20 villages in Ambajogai taluka and 7 villages in Bid taluka. Various health services were discussed in these gram sabhas, and measures were taken to improve them.

Rural people were asked questions about public health services and COVID vaccination to address their concerns and alleviate fears about the pandemic in Ghatanandur, Ambajogai taluka. In October 2021, a help desk was established at the primary health center in Ghatanandur to provide aid. The report of this help desk was sent to the District Health Officer and the State Coordination Institution in Pune.

Under this project, health posts were established in villages near Ghatanandur such as Salunkavadi, Chopanwadi, Ambalwadi, Krishna Nagar, Giravali, and Telghana, as well as in Pimpaladevi, Sandarvan, Limbararui Devi, and Mhalas. On June 16, 2021, the medical officer and the social evaluation program of the health sub-center in the taluka were discussed in a meeting with the medical officer.



During the second wave of the coronavirus, the number of COVID patients in rural areas of Beed district increased significantly. There were not enough private and government hospitals to treat the patients, and the administration was also overwhelmed. To ensure that the general public receives treatment on time, local administration and representatives collaborated with humanitarian organizations to establish 16 COVID centers in Beed district. As of October 2021, a total of 2537 patients were treated at these centers.

oxygen concentrators

After completing the treatment of COVID patients in hospitals, the need for oxygen was felt at home for several days. Poor patients did not have access to oxygen cylinders or oxygen concentrators. In this regard, the Human World Organization has provided oxygen concentrators at very nominal rates. Under this initiative, a total of 33 patients in Beed, Latur, and Osmanabad districts have benefited. A total of INR 52,600 has been collected through this program. There are 28 oxygen concentrators in total, out of which 2 are at the COVID center, 4 are at the sub-center Salegaon, 3 are with the patients, and 19 are on rent.

blood donation camp

On the occasion of the 39th Foundation Day of the Human World, a blood donation camp was organized at Swami Ramanand Teerth Medical College on April 1, 2021. A total of 19 workers donated blood.

On the occasion of the Amrut Mahotsav of Mr. Ashokraoji Deshmukh, President of the Human World Ambajogai, a free eye check-up camp was organized on February 27, 2022, at Ragunath Netralaya, Mondha Road, Ambajogai, under the guidance of Padmashri Dr. Tatyrao Lahane from Mumbai. A total of 903 people registered for the eye check-up camp online, and out of 1239 people who underwent the check-up, 413 people were given spectacles on April 14, 2022, at Shastri Nagar, Latur.

Health Treatment

Under this program, financial assistance is provided for the treatment of extremely vulnerable components in rural and urban areas. In the past year, assistance of Rs. 76,000/- has been provided to nine patients.

Also, **medical literature** related to essential elements has been made available to be used by poor patients and elderly people. The beneficiaries of this program are 1) Nandkumar Madhusudan Shitole - Walker, 2) Amol Kisanrao Videkar - Cot, 3) Sharad Shankarrao Radhikar - Cot, and 4) Sheikh Jafar Chhote Miya - Walker, who were provided with the mentioned items for their use.

7.1. Social Work College, Ambajogai



Based on the merit of the performance in the qualifying examination, 40 students have been admitted to the first year of the college for the academic year 2021-2022.

As part of the orientation program, the third-semester students visited various organizations including the Women and Child Development Office, Inspection House, Samata Foundation, International Justice Forum, and the Superintendent of Police Office in Beed. Similarly, first-semester students visited organizations such as Bodhvardhini Matimand Vidyalaya, Ahilyabai Holkar Girls School, Jan Sahyog Office, Manswini Women's Project, Humanitarian Headquarters, ICTC Center, Swami Ramanand Teerth Medical College and Hospital for orientation.

To develop skills and increase understanding of social issues, students of social work were trained through various methods, such as wearing five different types of clothing to understand the bodily experiences of others and learning about community organization from Dr. Sheikh Najir and Dr. Arundhati Patil.

In the college, in addition to the curriculum of the university, the following certificates are taught to the students: Self Help Group a Change Agent, Value Added Course on ICT Skill, Value Added Course on Design Project Proposal, Certificate Course in School Counseling, Value Added Course on Social Work Research Practice, Certificate Course in Water Literacy, Value Added Course on Soft Skill. On 1st December 2021, a meeting of students, parents, teachers, and management was held. Mrs. Anitaitai Tarkase, the parent representative, and Dr. Babasaheb Gore, Principal of Janvikas Mahavidyalaya Bansarola, and Mr. Aniket Lohiya, Executive Director of manavlok and college principal Dr. Prakash Jadhav were present as chief guests. At this time, a total of 45 parents and 60 students were present. During this meeting, the student code of conduct, rules and regulations for teachers and staff, and administration were explained to the parents and students.

On December 25, 2021, the first convocation ceremony of Manavlok College of Social Work was held at the college compos in Ambajogai. Dr. Narendra Kale, member of the management council of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University and Dr. Arun Dalve, Principal of Vasundhara College, were present as chief guests for the event. Mr. Aniket Lohiya, working for Manavlok, Ambajogai, chaired the event. The chief guests were escorted to the dais and the convocation ceremony began with the college song. During the event, degrees were awarded to students who graduated in the academic years 2016-17, 2017-18, and 2018-19. The program was conducted by Prof. Sukesini Jogdand and Dr. Rama Pande expressed her gratitude to the attendees.

On December 25, 2021, a reunion of former students was held at the college. Dr. Prakash Jadhav, Principal of the Human Social Work College, Ambajogai, presided over the reunion. Mr. Sugandh Palase, a social worker and former president of the student union, Dr. Hanumant Salunkhe, former student union officer, were also present. A total of 175 former students attended the event. The Human Social Work College has maintained a continuity of 22 years of excellence in the quality list of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar University, Aurangabad, since March 2020. The first five students on the university's quality list are from this college. This event was held in honor of these exceptional students on the occasion of the birthday of Dr. Dwaraka Das Lohiya (Babuji) on September 7, 2021, in the presence of Dr. Pramod Yeole, the Vice Chancellor of Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Dr. Narendra Kale, member of the management committee, Dr. Vidhate, member of the management committee, Dr. Valmik Sarode, head of the commerce and management department, Dr. Arundhati Patil, member of the academic council, Mr. Ashokrao Deshmukh, President of Human Society, and Mr. Aniket Lohiya, activist of Human Society.

Library: The college's Cloud Based Library Management Software, Masters Software, is worth Rs. 23,600/- in the college library. There are a total of 6011 books in the library. Six daily newspapers and 15 weekly/monthly journals are available in the library. To receive CSR funds for library construction, proposals were sent to J.S.W. Steel, Tata Steel, Bajaj Auto, Mahindra, Shri Siddhivinayak Trust, and all the philanthropists via email and postal mail.

7.2. Toy Bank

With the aim of providing joyful and playful education to rural students and enhancing their evaluation and activity skills, Mumbai's Open Tri Foundation has launched this initiative in 75 Zilla Parishad schools and 15 Anganwadi centers in Ambajogai, Kej, Parali, and Dharur talukas of Beed district. This program benefits around 7,000 rural students. It includes providing various types of games to schools, training teachers in the context of games, meetings with principals, conducting play sessions, and implementing such programs.

7.3. ChildLine

Manavlok works as a nodal agency in the Childline program for the Beed district. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Childline Foundation Mumbai provided online training. Tehsildar Shri. Ambekar and Puravtha Officer met and addressed ration-related issues of the Pardhi families living in the Vasanthwadi area of Beed city. Due to the lockdown, the Childline team made efforts to send eight young adults from Chandrapur district to their respective villages. The Childline team provided training on the POCSO Act, child marriage, and children's rights. Police Superintendent Harsh Poddar met and requested to stop child marriage and register complaints in this regard. The Resident District Collector met to stop child marriages in Beed district.

8. Jansahayog



The objective of this department is to provide various government schemes to the poor and marginalized sections of society through the components under the poverty line. Under this department, a total of 268 applications were received for various certificates, 408 applications were received for the Shravanbal Yojana, out of which 184 were approved, 253 applications were received for the Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar Yojana, out of which 176 were approved, and 31 applications were received for the National Family Financial Assistance Scheme, out of which 25 were approved. The process of submitting 35 applications for APL certificates and 53 applications for BPL certificates is underway. One application was received for the replacement of an old ration card.

During the public cooperation campaign, a meeting was held with 700 members from the 370 villages where they were given certificates in the meeting. During the meeting, discussions were held on women's health check-ups and sanitation.

In addition, 850 elderly people were provided with basic supplies through donations in cash. A meeting was also held for single women at the public cooperation office, which was attended by members of various women's organizations, including Mahananda Chavan, Kalpanatai Lohiya, and Dr. Archana Thorat. The program was organized with the help of the Tehsil office in Ambajogai and the Human World Public Cooperation Office. Sub-district officer Sharad Jadhav, Tehsildar Bipin Patil, and the president of the organization, Ashokrao Deshmukh, were present.

09 Manaswini Mahila Prakalp

SWISSAID INDIA is supporting the Manasvini Women's Project, which addresses gender-based discrimination and domestic violence in the Marathwada region of Maharashtra, India. The project includes 20 villages in Ambajogai taluka and 10 villages in Dharur taluka. Additionally, seven women have received guidance and financial support to start small businesses through the Rural Livelihoods Promotion Project, which was inspired by the economic support provided by Indian farmers. These businesses aim to empower widows, abandoned, and single women to be self-sufficient.

In the second wave of COVID-19, a serious situation arose and a complete lockdown was not imposed. As a result, there were many difficulties faced by the labor class who had no work and income. Keeping this in mind, a humane women's project was launched in the project area for widows, abandoned women, and single women. On August 12, 2021, a total of 45 women from 4 villages in the taluka and 25 women from 6 villages in Ambajogai taluka were given 2 pregnant sheep each, totaling 90 pregnant sheep for the 45 women, to rear them. During the COVID period, when the education of adolescent girls was interrupted due to various reasons, some girls had not gone to school before. Therefore, to prevent child marriage, after providing them with sewing training, these girls were given sewing machines to work on. Out of a total of 30 girls who received sewing training, 25 were given sewing machines.



During the Corona lockdown, many child marriages were taking place on a large scale. After realizing this, the district collector of Beed has assigned the responsibility of child marriage prevention officers to the gram sevaks in every village, as per the government circular. In the 28 villages where the project for determined equality is being implemented, the gram panchayats have formed a child marriage prevention committee, and the committee's establishment has contributed to the prevention of child marriage.

In the current situation, 22 self-help centers have been established for women and girls in 13 villages. These centers offer facilities such as indoor games like volleyball, netball, chess, carrom, cricket kits, and other sports equipment, a collection of 60 books, lockers, chess, Savitribai Phule, and Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar's photos. Different skill training programs have also been initiated for women and girls based on their requirements. So far, 352 women and girls have registered and started reading books at these 22 self-help centers.

In a recent event, a campaign against domestic violence and child marriage was launched in eight villages. The objective of the campaign was to reduce violence against women, promote respect for women, improve relationships between husbands and wives, and to eliminate misconceptions and prejudices about women among men. Posters were displayed in schools to create awareness among students and their parents about the laws related to child marriage and violence against girls. Essay competitions were also organized for students and competitions were held for parents. As a result, 240 students, including 123 boys and 117 girls, from four schools participated in these events.

On 19th, 20th, and 21st August 2021, Sujit Varma from Swisade organized a meeting with Dr. Arundhati Patil and the project team at the Atmabhan Center, Bal Vivah Samiti, youth, and beneficiaries were met. Also, on 10th, 11th, and 12th December 2021, Sneha Giridhari, from Swisade, held a meeting with the project team and the inspiring motivator on the work done and the planning for future work, in the context of the village.

On the occasion of Krantijyoti Savitribai Phule's Jayanti, a Balika Diwas was celebrated to honor women and girls. The motivator, project staff, and members of various groups from the village celebrated this day in their own homes, similar to Diwali, and men gave gifts to women and girls in their homes.

At the counseling center, a total of 173 cases have been recorded, out of which 50 cases have been resolved and the remaining 81 cases have been closed. Of the cases filed in court, 23 cases related to child marriage and 14 cases related to women's rights were put on hold, 7 cases were settled out of court, and one case resulted in the rescue of a child. In total, compensation of Rs. 9,50,000 was awarded to 7 cases, and 3 cases were awarded Rs. 3,000 each and 1 case was awarded Rs. 5,000 as compensation.

At the Women's Study Center, a report was submitted stating that 10 girls had enrolled for the course and their total fee of Rs. 1,150/- was deposited in the accounts department.

Trupti Kitchen **(Food Distribution System for Senior Citizens)**

In rural areas, the Trupti (Community Kitchen) program is implemented for the benefit of senior citizens who do not have a regular source of food. This program is implemented in 34 villages, where a total of 493 beneficiaries received 2,93,460 meals at a cost of Rs. 58,69,200/-. In the financial report, a total of Rs. 12,05,871/- was collected from the beneficiaries and community participation.

According to the report, 82 beneficiaries were affected due to various reasons, out of which 41 passed away and the remaining 33 beneficiaries faced reduced participation due to their health or caring for a child.

On August 2, 2021, a new kitchen was started in Daithana and on October 5, 2021, it was started in Kolakandi. As part of Diwali, 461 people including 420 senior citizens and 41 kitchen staff were served meals in 34 Trupti kitchens located in 32 villages under the organization's 5 centers. The kitchen operations were supported by Mr. Amit Chandraji, Mr. Nimeshbhai, and Mr. Oscar Gomes, who held discussions with kitchen beneficiaries, kitchen staff, and village management committees. Monthly reports are sent for the kitchen operations.

11. Department of Transportation

Currently, there are 4 four-wheeled vehicles, 6 two-wheeled vehicles, and 2 tractors. There are also 9 tractor-operated farming tools (2 trolleys, plow, harrow, rotavator, laser land leveler, boom spray, and 2 cultivators) and 11 JCB machines owned by the organization. The maintenance cost and fuel expenses for all these vehicles amounted to INR 4,54,704.62/- and INR 11,16,410.36/- (excluding the sale of JCB machines), and a total of INR 2,21,764/- has been deposited from vehicle fees.

To deal with COVID patients, a MH 44-G 1215 vehicle was converted into an ambulance. A new ambulance was also acquired during the reporting period.



12. Department of Stores

During the period under review, various items were purchased for various departments of the organization, resulting in an expenditure of Rs. 2,46,32,440.50/-. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the organization also procured PPE kits, sanitizers, masks, etc. Additionally, various literature was also purchased for Swami Ramanand Teerth Medical College and Hospital and other medical facilities.

During the accounting period, a total of 24 home solar systems were available, of which 9 were sold and 2 were given on loan for agriculture purposes. Currently, there are a total of 13 systems available. The cost of each solar lamp was 11, and 5 lamps were sold, leaving 6 remaining. In the sales ledger, there were 176 lamps, of which 47 were sold, leaving a total of 129 lamps. The total sales amount recorded in the ledger was 723 lamps, with a total deposit of Rs. 14,420 from the sales of scrap, junk, broken items, wood, etc.

13. Sources of organization's finances

The organization has received resources worth Rs. 6,58,468/- from various sources such as equipment, agricultural land, community center, training center, computers, projectors, photocopiers, rental income from buildings and warehouses, vehicles, etc.

14.Special Programs

1. 39th World Health Day - April 1, 2021

The 39th World Health Day was celebrated on April 1, 2021. Due to the serious situation of the second wave of COVID-19, restrictions had to be put in place. Therefore, on the day of the World Health Day, a blood donation camp was organized at Swami Ramanand Teerth Medical College and Hospital. 19 donors donated blood at the blood donation camp. Thus, the World Health Day was celebrated in this way.

2. K.G. Dr. Dwarakadasji Lohiya (Babuji) Memorial Event

On the occasion of the memorial day of the respected founder of Manavlok organization, Dr. Dwarakadas Shaligram Lohiya (Babuji), a lecture series was organized jointly by Manavlok and Manavlok Social Work College, Ambajogai. The event included webinars that are available to watch on Manavlok's Facebook page.

3. COVID-19 Crisis Management

Due to the second wave of COVID-19, a serious situation arose in the Beed district. It was realized that there were no adequate hospitals for treatment of poor people, which led to the establishment of COVID care centers in rural areas with the cooperation of the government. Human Lok Foundation decided to set up 100 COVID care centers at its headquarters, out of which 80 centers were started. These centers have been equipped with CCTVs, water filters, and other facilities. On 26/04/2021, the online inauguration of the COVID Care Center, started in Manavlok, Bansarola, Ghatanandur, was done by Honorable MLA Smt. Supriyatai Sule and Honorable Minister of Women and Child Development and Social Justice, Government of Maharashtra, Shri Dhananjay Munde.



4. Free Cataract surgery camp organized

A free eye screening camp was organized in honor of the Amrut Mahotsav by the current chairman of the people, Mr. Ashokrao Deshmukh. During this camp, senior ophthalmologists Padmashree Dr. Tatyarao Lahane, Swarajya Vaidya Mahamandal and hospital administrator Dr. Bhaskar Khair, along with Dr. Ragini Parekh, head of the ophthalmology department at JJ Hospital Mumbai, conducted eye examinations. A total of 1239 patients were screened, and 413 patients were registered for free motibindu surgery. The motibindu surgery will be performed on April 14, 2022, in the presence of Padmashree Dr. Tatyarao Lahane.



5. Financial assistance to families of male COVID-19 victims

Many families have faced difficulties due to the death of male members in their families during the COVID-19 pandemic. To address this, some male workers in various fields have come forward and submitted online registrations of such families in need. As part of this effort, on the occasion of the third memorial day of Dr. Dwarkadas Lohiya Babuji, 30 families facing financial difficulties were each provided with a cash grant of Rs. 30,000 through the hands of philanthropists.



6. Disaster Relief

In September 2021, there was heavy rainfall in Beed district. Many villages were flooded due to overflowing of Manjara, Holna and Vana rivers, causing extensive damage to crops and homes. Many livestock were lost and books were damaged due to flooding of homes caused by the overflow of the rivers. People immediately surveyed the affected areas and distributed 400 ration kits, controlled the water supply and other resources. After conducting a thorough survey of the affected areas, more than 200 affected farming families were provided with financial assistance by the people.



Due to heavy rainfall in Chipalun taluka of Ratnagiri and Raigad districts, the residents suffered significant losses and even their homes were flooded with water. When this information came to light, a team of 20 workers immediately went to Chipalun to help the affected people. Through the efforts of the National Service Scheme and the local people, essential items such as clothing and daily-use items were provided to the affected families to uplift their morale and provide mental support.



7. Bhartiya Dhan Vikas Mission

Bajra, also known as pearl millet, is a gluten-free, highly nutritious and fiber-rich food. These grains are rich in micronutrients such as calcium, iron, phosphorus, and others. Their glycemic index (GI) is low, which means they do not cause a significant spike in blood sugar levels. Therefore, such grains should be an integral part of our daily diet.

Bead is identified as one of the various grains such as bajra and jowar. We have studied the potential of various grains through webinars around the world and have collected information on potential pearl millet production in the region. With this in mind, we are planning to start the Bhartiya Dhan Vikas Mission initiative soon for pearl millet cultivation in the Beed district.

8. A project of utilizing modern technology to control water usage in sugarcane cultivation

It is well-known that sugarcane requires a significant amount of water for cultivation and taking crops that require more water in drought-prone regions of Maharashtra can become a major challenge. In addition, compared to other alternatives, stopping sugarcane cultivation is also difficult. Therefore, we are making efforts to reduce water usage in sugarcane cultivation through optimal irrigation. To achieve this, we are conducting research using various satellite and sensor-based technologies for sugarcane cultivation. Our project is being supported by Conserve Water, a tech startup that is helping us in this endeavor.



Mr. Aniket Lohiya has successfully completed the work of Dr. Dwarkadas Lohiya (Babuji) to create essential facilities for drought relief in the fields of Marathwada. Over the past ten years, he has undertaken significant work for the development of the watershed area, including the improvement of water capacity and surface water. In recognition of his efforts, he was honored with the second prize of the Jalbhushan Award 2020 on July 13, 2021, during the birth centenary of late Chief Minister Shri. Shankarrao Chavan, by the Chief Minister of Maharashtra, Mr. Uddhav Thackeray, on behalf of the State Government.



On December 26, 2021, Smriti Shesh Ramlingappa Vairagkar Social Organization, Umaraga, Usmanabad, through the efforts of Mr. Aniket Lohiya, was awarded the Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Smriti Puraskar for their social work carried out through the medium of human beings. The award was presented by respected Mrs. Medhati Patkar and Mr. Rajendra Hunje.



On March 30, 2022, for the work done in the area of water and soil conservation in Marathwada and outside Marathwada by Mr. Aniket Lohiya, the Ministry of Water Resources, Government of India, honored him with the Jalprahari award. The award was given by Mr. Giriraj Singh, Minister of Central Water Resources Ministry, Baba Rajendrasingh Rana, promoter of river linking, Mr. Amey Sathe of Sarkar Dot Com, famous entrepreneur Rasic Kunkulol, and Khasedar Mr. Gopal Shetty and Mr. Unmesh Patil at Constitutional Hall in New Delhi.

This award was announced by the Editor-in-Chief of the Water Resources, River Development and Ganga Rejuvenation Department, Mr. Amar Sathy and Mr. Anil Singh. On December 31, 2021, for the Clean Survey-2022, Mr. Aniket Lohiya's selection has been made as the brand ambassador by Ambajogai Municipal Council.

16. Construction work:

During the report period, construction work was carried out on the premises of the headquarters and sub-centers. At the headquarters, work was done on the vehicle shed, painting of the headquarters building, construction of a communication room, renovation of the power block, construction of side walls, repairing the roof of the meeting hall, etc. The total expenditure on all these works amounted to Rs. 7,44,325/-.



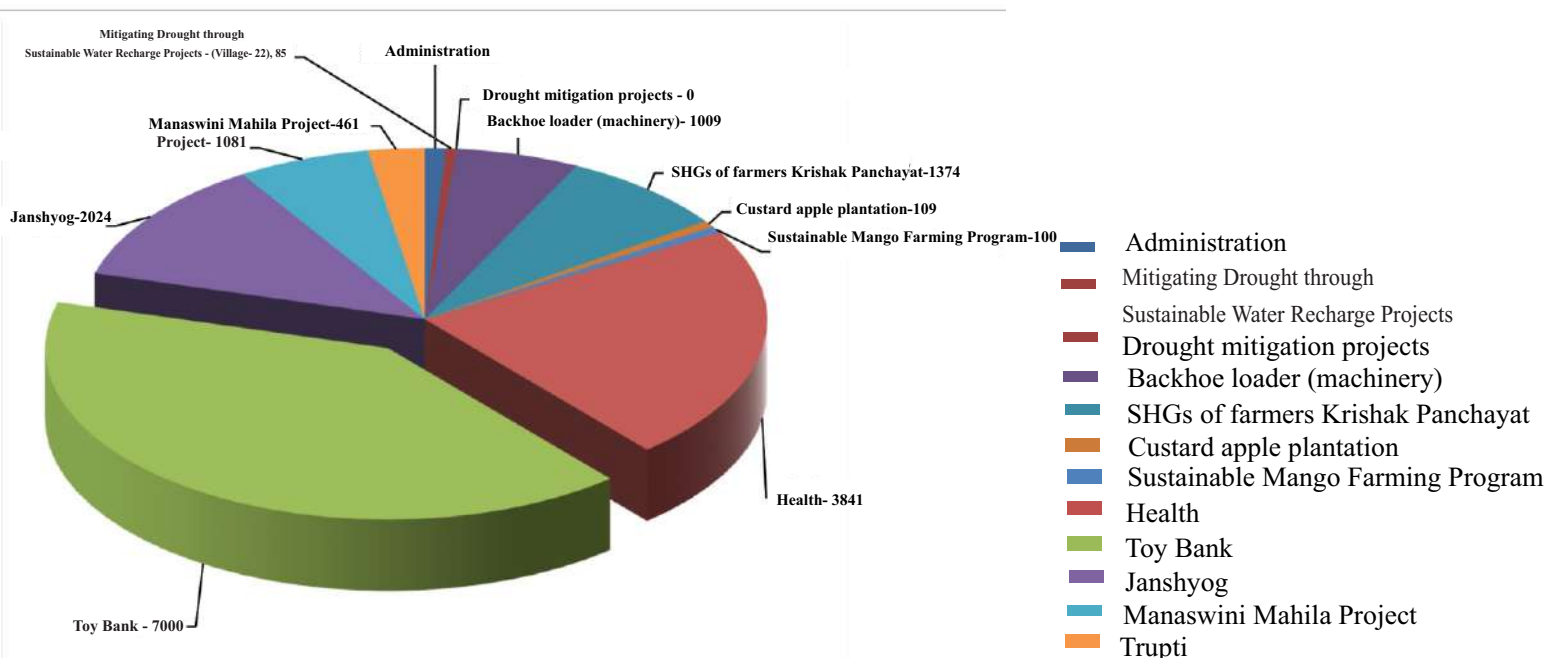
